Pastor's Message



One of my divinity school professors told his students that they should read at least one poem every day. I think that is good advice. This is a poem by Robert Frost, *The Pasture*:

I'm going out to clean the pasture spring;
I'll only stop to rake the leaves away
(And wait to watch the water clear, I may):
I shan't be gone long – you come too.
I'm going out to fetch the little calf
That's standing by the mother. It's so young
It totters when she licks it with her tongue.
I shan't be gone long – you come too.

This sensitive little poem is an invitation to go into deeper places of the mind and heart to clear away the accumulated debris; an invitation to go down to the depths of the soul and understand more clearly the source of love and compassion, without which life is mere existence.

Rabbi Rami Shapiro recently wrote an article entitled "My Religion Is Love," in which he says things about Judaism that many of us could say about our Christian faith. "Judaism does matter," he wrote, "but not in any self-reverential way. Judaism matters for the only reason any religion matters: it makes us more loving, or it should." He defines love as "the capacity to feel another's pain without guilt, share another's joy without envy, and work with others to uplift the fallen, free the wrongly imprisoned, and

Theology and the Financial Crisis Dr. Kathryn Tanner Sunday, May 6

Last month, I wrote about a talk at Yale Divinity School given by Dr. Rodger Nishioka, Associate Professor of Christian Education at Columbia Theological Seminary. One of the statistics he cited involves group formation – that it takes at least seventeen contact hours for a group

of people (same people) to feel that they are a group. If even one or two people change, the contact hours go back to zero. Nishioka stated that this number has increased over the years and is expected to increase again because of our very busy schedules and reliance on electronic communications. All of us in the room understood the implications of this statistic for our ministries. When children and youth are not able to be together regularly in church activities because of such things as sports, it will be a very long time – maybe years – before a feeling of "group-ness" develops. And for young people, feeling part of the group is important.

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The best way to achieve seventeen contact hours is through extended activities and overnights. As the youth groups at RHCC begin to form, I will be planning activities that will help us get to seventeen contact hours more quickly. All of us in the Church might think through how we can create seventeen contact hours with others in the Church, and how this could enhance and strengthen our common witness and ministry.

Church School

In April we learned the Easter story and looking at ways people were changed because of it. Part of the lesson includes doing a mission project, and I am thrilled that all eight of the children who somewhat regularly attend Church School walked in the Greenwich CROP Walk to raise awareness of and money for hunger issues, locally and abroad. Their parents deserve a great deal of credit for clearing the family schedules so they all, as families, could walk together. What a wonderful way to model and teach how Christians are people who think of others and help others. The Church School children also designed lunch bags to be given to homeless people served by the Pacific House in Stamford.

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In May, we will be studying a unit called "Acceptance," based on the story in Acts 10:1-48, when the early church was deciding whether or not Gentiles could be included, and eventually did decide so. The children will learn:

- We are all created in the image of God.
- We believe God's love is for all people.
- God's love is also for us we need to accept ourselves.
- When we recognize our diverse and unique gifts, we can work together to serve God and others.
- It is important not to prejudge people.
- We can work to accept others.
- We can be sensitive to our own behaviors or language that may show prejudice.
- We can learn about and show appreciation for other cultures, countries, and peoples.

Plans are under way for a summer mission trip. We will be coordinating with RAMP America, an organization headquartered in Old Greenwich. Amy Guerrieri, a busy mother of four and entrepreneur, founded the Rockin' Appalachian Mom Project last year after she was inspired by watching a television special entitled "The Hidden America."

Guerrieri's unique approach to the community was felt immediately – instead of trying to solve the huge problem of poverty, Guerrieri took the initiative to work community-to-community, family-to-family, Mom-to-Mom, and kid-to-kid. By mentoring several families that were truly in need, and aligning RAMP with the schools and a food pantry that served a large, but manageable group of families, RAMP has made a measurable difference in the lives of these families in a short period of time.

RAMP invests in the local residents for today and the future.

The one thing RAMP does is it keeps coming back – and this is something the community notices. Previously, people would come to help – once, maybe twice – and then they would be gone. RAMP invests in the local residents for today and the future.

RAMP America serves the poor in Martin County, Kentucky, in the Appalachian Mountains. An initial project will be doing home repair for a mom and her four children, to help ensure the safety and well-being of the children. The dates of the trip are Sunday, August 12, through Saturday, August 18.

Les Beaux Arts Gallery

Les Beaux Arts Gallery is wrapping up its season with "View from Above," a fine modernist art exhibit by Greenwich artist Hazel Jarvis. The show opens on Sunday, May 6, and runs through June 21.

Through the years, Jarvis's style has evolved from dainty botanicals to bold, colorful organic paintings. "View from Above" features a series of paintings from the last two years and pays homage to the artist's most personal inspiration, her home and studio space on the Mianus River and her recent travels in the American Southwest. Some paintings are transformed into maps of a bird's life resulting from the hours the artist spent birdwatching. Others are intimate landscapes of New England and local scenes.



The artist's travels in New Mexico are reflected in landscapes depicting the region's wide open space and high bird's-eye views. These works are complemented by other studies featuring the bright colors and unique light characteristics of the Santa Fe area.

Jarvis teaches art classes as well as painting. Her work has been included in "Branching Out," an invitational show organized by the Greenwich Tree Conservancy in 2011 and "Winter Brushstrokes: The Sketchbooks of Hazel Jarvis and Her Students" at the River Gallery in the Westport Library (2009-10). She is represented by Phyllis Wrynn Gallery in New York City, where her work is currently displayed in "Spring and Summer Show."

TRANSITION COMMITTEE

Report on Governance Matters

RHCC was incorporated in 1952 and is chartered under Connecticut law as a nondenominational church non–profit corporation. The core governance documents of RHCC are (i) the Articles of Incorporation filed in 1952 and amended once by vote of the Congregation in 1995 (the "Articles"), and (ii) the By–Laws last revised as of March 2, 1992 (the "By-Laws"). In addition, in late 2008/early 2009 Bob Culp prepared a Draft "Handbook for Round Hill Community Church" (the "Draft Handbook"). Although it was discussed by the Board of Trustees in late 2008/early 2009, the Draft Handbook has not been adopted.

RHCC has been governed as a faith community under its short-form Articles and equally short-form By-Laws. Authority for action has been (when required) through a vote of the Congregation and otherwise through action by the Trustees and Trustee-delegated authority to committees, officers, and the pastor.

The Transition Committee concluded that RHCC's governance documents have proven both forward-looking and well-suited to the mission and character of our church.

The Transition Committee concluded that RHCC's governance documents have proven both forward-looking and well-suited to the mission and character of our church. They have been durable and flexible over a very significant length of time.

Our Pastoral Transition is the highest priority facing the Church today. The By-Laws address the pastoral transition process clearly and specifically. It is noteworthy that final selection of a permanent pastor is one of the specific powers vested by the By-Laws in the Congregation. The process set forth in the By-Laws is centered on a "recommendation" by the Pastoral Relations Committee, "due consideration" and

"nomination" by a majority vote of a quorum of the Board of Trustees, and "approval of the nomination" by a vote of the Congregation.

At its April 2 meeting, the Board of Trustees voted to reconstitute the Search Committee as the Pastoral Relations Committee to ensure that the search for a new permanent pastor currently underway is consistent with our By-Laws.

Understanding and communication of governance documents and practice is critical to any faith or other community. While RHCC's governance documents and practices have stood the test of time the Transition Committee has concluded that a clear, simple resource that lays out Church governance is needed. The Articles and By-Laws are framework documents. The Draft Handbook – shortened and updated and then adopted by the Board of Trustees – could be this resource. A formally approved Handbook also would limit the number of issues that need to be addressed in By-Law amendments from time to time.

Further, a Handbook would clarify the goals and objectives and authority of the Church's committees. Our By-Laws do not name or define the role or powers of any committees other than of the Executive Committee (generally empowered with authority of the Board), the Pastoral Relations Committee with respect to the pastor selection process, and the Nominating Committee. However, there are more than 25 Board-authorized committees today, some of which are inactive, and some of which are duplicative.

Committees can be the driving force of activity in any church community. They are where the work of the community gets done, where ideas and vision are most directly discussed, and where church members are empowered to innovate and advance the mission and goals of the church.

The Transition Committee recommends that a short, clear, easy-to-update Handbook be prepared and approved by the Board of Trustees to more clearly outline and communicate RHCC governance, including the number and structure of our Church's committees.
