SPIRIT OF ROUND HILL

The second phase addresses the needs of the aging Community House. We have hired an architect and will soon be in the planning phase of this project, which will begin in the spring of 2009.

The third phase involves relocating the church offices and creating a more welcoming place for our members to take advantage of our ministers' services.

We are truly blessed as a congregation to have two wonderful ministers, a dedicated and knowledgable office staff, a beautiful church to worship in, fabulous music, a fun church school, and thoughtful and kind members to worship with. Whether you come to church for the beautiful music, to listen to thoughtful sermons, to make new friends, or to give of your time, we truly appreciate your presence and we together create the Spirit of the Round Hill Community Church.

There is much mystery at the heart of such prayer, and we hope to draw near this mystery and affirm its place along our own spiritual journeys.

Bible Studies on the Prophet Isaiah Sundays, January 13 and February 3, 11:15 a.m.

Bob Culp will lead two forums that focus on the prophecy of First Isaiah (Is 1-39) and Second Isaiah (Is 40-55), seeking to identify how the criticizing and energizing language within the book of Isaiah is tied to their respective historical situations and their respective spiritual needs, and seeking to identify possible parallels with our own historical situation in 2008. WOMEN'S BOOK CLUB

We will be discussing *The Pillars of the Earth* by Ken Follett on January 15, from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. at Edie Wilson's house.

Ken Follett says of his book:

"When I started writing, back in the early seventies, I found I had no vocabulary for describing buildings. I read a couple of books on architecture and developed an interest in cathedrals. I became a bit of a train spotter on the subject. I would go to a town, like Lincoln or Winchester, check into a hotel and spend a couple of days looking around the cathedral and learning about it. Before too long, it occurred to me to channel this enthusiasm into a novel.

My publishers were a little nervous about such a very unlikely subject but paradoxically, it is my most popular book. It's also the book I'm most proud of. It recreates, quite vividly, the entire life of the village and the people who live there. You feel you know the place and the people as intimately as if you yourself were living there in the middle ages."

LES BEAUX ARTS GALLERY

Works by folk painter Anne Strasberg will be on display December 1 to January 9 at Les Beaux Arts Gallery.



Impulsive joie de vivre is a signature of Strasberg's work. Her colorful pictures of serene villages, quiet meadows, and seaside activities transport the viewer for a moment to a much nicer world. Anne is a true naïve-primitive folk painter, in the traditional sense of self-taught, traveling, working painters. Anne lives part of the year in Manhattan with her husband, John Strasberg, the international theater director, actor, producer, and designer. They travel the rest of the year, mostly in Europe, and Anne always has her brushes and paints close at hand. Her paintings reflect her travels and her rich imagination, and embrace a diversity of subject and originality of colors.

Strasberg was born and raised in Paris. At a very young age, she was drawn to being a designer and painter, and dreamed of studying at the Beaux Arts. Her parents, however, decided otherwise and she studied at the Ecole de Commerce at Paris. She abandoned the idea of becoming a painter until many years later when she met a painter-interior designer who encouraged her to begin painting and not wait for classes. She began to paint her children and the Normandy countryside where her family had a weekend home. In 1983, she won a prize for second place in Art Naif (Folk Art) in an exhibition at la Roche Guyon in France. From that moment on, Anne has painted regularly and now exhibits permanently at the Galerie de Naif et Primitif in Paris and the Galerie Bonheur in St. Louis, Missouri.
