A Fresh Taste of God

About the season of Lent, Ann Weems says this:

Lent is a time to take the time to let the power of our faith story take hold of us, a time to let the events get up and walk around in us, a time to intensify our living unto Christ, a time to hover over the thoughts of our hearts, a time to place our feet in the streets of Jerusalem or to walk along the sea and listen to his word, a time to touch his robe and feel the healing surge through us, a time to ponder and a time to wonder . . . Lent is a time to allow a fresh taste of God!

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 6, with a simple Communion service and meal at the church that will start us on our spiritual journey through this holy season. In the weeks between Ash Wednesday and Easter Day, we will be offering a variety of ministries through which we hope to deepen the spiritual experience of all who participate.

From the pulpit beginning on February 10, we will present a five-part sermon series on the Lord's Prayer, using Wayne Muller's excellent book *Learning to Pray: How We Find Heaven on Earth*. Prayer is such a central part of our faith, and yet it is a dynamic about which we know so little and with which we struggle to make a satisfying and fulfilling dimension within our daily journey of faith. My hope is that through these sermons and services we will all be strengthened as we seek to make our way into the

Matthew and Manners Children's Lenten Program Wednesdays, February 13 and March 5 6:00 p.m., Parlor

In Matthew's gospel, a Pharisaic lawyer asks Jesus, "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the law?" Jesus tells him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it. You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

According to Matthew, the very essence of the law and the prophets is to love God and to love others. We find the biblical definition for love in Matthew's gospel when Jesus says, "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you." (Matthew 7:12)

"Matthew and Manners" is an opportunity for children to learn what Jesus says about love in the Bible and how to put it into practice. Marion Piro will teach the children how we interact with one another and show respect to parents, peers, and family. This will be an educational, entertaining, and spiritual two nights for the children.

After sharing a simple meal in the Parlor with other families adults and youth will break out for age appropriate study groups. "Matthew and Manners" is directed to church school aged children. Childcare will be available for younger children.

- 3) what makes conflict a constructive thing;
- 4) how passion and play evolve as a couple

We will also offer two unique Wednesday fellowship and study gatherings for families and members of all ages – on February 13 and March 5. On each of those dates, we will gather for a simple meal, break off into different study and age groups, and then come back together for a closing prayer time.

Joel Baehr will be back with us for two Tuesday evenings of guided meditation sessions, following up his very popular and meaningful meditation sessions that took place in December. The 20 participants in December reflected a hunger and appreciation for these meditation times that invited them into a deeper experience of the Holy in our midst and in our lives, and we are pleased to be able to have Joel back with us on Tuesday, February 26, and Tuesday, March 25.

Special Holy Week offerings include a special Palm Sunday Service with the church school children leading us in a "Walk through Holy Week" after the service, our traditional Maundy Thursday Christian Passover Seder and Communion Service, participation in the Good Friday Service at Christ Episcopal Church, and culminating in our festive celebration on Easter Day, beginning with a musical prelude at 9:30 a.m., featuring the music of Bach, with the sermon at the 10:00 a.m. service entitled "Resurrection in the Present Tense."

MUSIC AT ROUND HILL

Choir to Present 20th-Century Choruses

On three consecutive Sundays during Lent, the choir will perform excerpts from three choral masterpieces from the 20th century.

February 24

Selections from Poulenc's *Gloria* March 2 Portions of Leonard Bernstein's *Chichester Psalms* March 9

First chorus of Benjamin Britten's Rejoice in the Lamb

All three works, perhaps due to their immediate accessibility, have found permanent and prominent places in the choral repertoire. But as one might expect from composers of such diverse cultural backgrounds – the urbane Frenchman, the jazzy New Yorker, and the austere Brit – each writes in a very particular and personal musical style.

The sensual writing of the Poulenc *Gloria* reflects the sophisticated stance of the Parisian boulevardier while Britten's snappy rhythms are the perfect vehicle for Christopher Smart's mystical poetry. The deeply religious but mentally unstable Smart wrote "Rejoice in the Lamb" while confined to an asylum. The opening chorus after a somber introduction breaks into a wild litany of praise as numerous Old Testament personages are joyously called forth.

England's Chichester Cathedral commissioned Bernstein to set a number of the Psalms to music. The *Chichester Psalms*, along with the *Kaddish Symphony*, are the only works of Bernstein that are conspicuously Jewish. Some thematic material was taken from a Jewish gang fight sequence that was in the original concept for *West Side Story*. The idea of a Jewish gang fight was understandably dropped. The choruses are wonderful, so we are inviting skillful singers from the church and community to join us. These works, however, are not without difficulty. Therefore, in order to make a confident contribution, (and avoid personal embarassement), we ask that the mandatory attendance policy at Thursday rehearsals from February 21 until March 6 be observed.
