Near the middle of the 19th century, Alexis de Tocqueville wrote this:

"I sought for the greatness and genius of America in her commodious harbors and her ample rivers, and it was not there; in her fertile fields and

boundless prairies, and it was not there; in her rich mines and her vast world commerce, and it was not there. Not until I went to the churches of America and heard her pulpits aflame with righteousness did I understand the secret of her genius and power. America is great because she is good, and if America ever ceases to be good, America will cease to be great."

There is no question that the religious community has exercised a tremendous impact upon the quality of life in our country, and it continues to have significant influence on those programs that seek to address the tender needs of those who are hungry, and hurting, and homeless. Somehow, because of what is preached from the pulpit, or is heard from the choir, or is addressed and discussed within study groups of all kinds and sizes, or is experienced within the fellowship and relationships among members of God's family, or is expressed in prayers by individuals and groups, there is a beckoning call of conscience that touches our citizens profoundly and finds its way along the halls of Congress, into the political debates of our time, and into the laws of our land, still expressing something of the hopes and dreams of our nation's founders.


Thorne Lecturer Bruce Feiler Saturday, January 26 7:00 p.m., Sanctuary

At a moment when the world is asking, "Can the religions get along?" Bruce Feiler, bestselling author of *Walking the Bible* and *Abraham*, offers a powerful interfaith message and a hopeful vision for peace and reconciliation. His work has helped bring people together, sparking dialogue about faith and community, religion and politics, and shared values.

For centuries, people of all faiths have committed terrible violence . . . sometimes in the "name of God." Many are left disillusioned and cynical. For this year's Thorne Lecture, Bruce Feiler's topic for discussion will be "Who Speaks for God: Reclaiming Religion from Extremists."

The lecture will begin at 7:00 p.m. and be followed by a response from an interfaith panel, which will consist of local religious leaders Rabbi Mitch

Curriculum Change

According to the church school schedule devised and announced last September, our January curriculum was to focus on David, king of Israel. We are going to postpone this topic and focus instead on the Bible – how it was written and compiled, how it is organized, and where to find different stories or passages. Some key points will include:

- The Bible is a sacred book, telling the story of God and God's people.
- The Bible contains God's words, written by many different people over many years.
- The Bible is made up of two main sections the Old Testament or Hebrew Scriptures and the New Testament.
- There are a total of 66 books in the Bible 39 books in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament.



Please talk with your child about the Bible and your knowledge of it. We will mail some ideas home for you to use and discuss with your children.

Bible Studies on the Prophet Isaiah Sundays after Worship January 13 and February 3

Leader: Bob Culp

It has been observed by Marcus Borg that "the classic prophets of ancient Israel are among the most remarkable people who ever lived. Their language is memorable, poetic, and powerful. Their passion and courage are exceptional. Their message combines radical criticism of the way things are with urgent advocacy of another way of being. Their dream is God's dream of a just society. And, in their own words, they speak for God."

Rather than offering a review of all the major and minor prophets of Israel, Bob Culp will lead two forums that focus on the prophecy of First Isaiah (Is 1-39) and Second Isaiah (Is 40-55), seeking to identify how the criticizing and energizing language within the book of Isaiah is tied to their respective historical situations and their respective spiritual needs . . . and seeking, too, to identify possible parallels with our own historical situation in 2008. It is hoped that through these two sessions, a rather intriguing picture both of God and of Isaiah will emerge that may speak powerfully to us today.

Fiction writing is surely one of life's great adventures. If you are ready to start the journey, to plunge courageously into the writer's world of inventing and problem-solving, this workshop is for you. And be assured, you will be helped and guided at every step along the way.

This workshop will go deeply into the art and craft of fiction, including structuring the story, characterization, point of view, plotting, sub-plotting, scene construction, dialogue, dramatic tension, pacing, and narrative voice. As these issues arise in the class readings and discussions, they will be explored for everyone's benefit.

The workshop is geared to writers whose stories are already on the way, or at least have already been conceived. We will take turns lighting the way for each other.


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

Mr. Feiler will then field questions from the audience. A reception will follow with opportunities to have Mr. Feiler sign his books, *Abraham, Walking the Bible*, and *Where God Was Born*.


In Walking the Bible: A Journey by Land through the Five Books of Moses, Feiler recounts his travels through the Middle East, connecting biblical stories to their actual sites and interviewing people from many religious traditions. In Abraham: A Journey to the Heart of Three Faiths, Feiler retraces the footsteps of the common ancestor of Jews, Christians, and Muslims. "September 11 contributed to a whole-sale rethinking of how religions relate to one another," says Feiler. "Abraham holds the key to understanding what separates these religions – and, ultimately, what unites them."

Feiler builds on his winning combination of history, religion, adventure, and personal discovery with *Where God Was Born: A Journey by Land to the Roots of Religion*. The book recounts his 10,000-mile trek through Israel, Iraq, and Iran, visiting archaeological and biblical sites and uncovering new information about the untold links among Judaism, Christianity, and Islam.

Feiler has visited over 60 countries, immersing himself in different cultures and recording his experiences in six critically acclaimed books. He has been a schoolteacher in Japan (*Learning to Bow*), a student









at Oxford and Cambridge (*Looking for Class*), a circus clown (*Under the Big Top*), and a traveler with singer Garth Brooks (*Dreaming Out Loud*).

A graduate of Yale, Feiler holds a master's degree in international relations from Cambridge. A regular contributor to NPR's "All Things Considered," he has written for *The New York Times Magazine*, *The New Yorker*, and the *Washington Post*, and is a contributing editor at *Gourmet* and *Parade*.

In January of 2006, PBS aired Walking the Bible with Bruce Feiler, a landmark three-part TV miniseries written, produced, and hosted by Feiler and based on his bestselling book. The Wall Street Journal called the program, which is part adventure story, part archaeological detective work, and part spiritual exploration, "three splendid hours of television" and Feiler "an engaging and informed guide."


FLOWER COMMITTEE

LES BEAUX ARTS GALLERY



Artistic needlepoints by Greenwich resident Edith Fehr will be on display at Les Beaux Arts Gallery January 13 through February 7. The exhibit pays tribute to the 90+ year-old artist and includes two pieces from her weavings as well as three of the color studies that were created for her by another artist painter, Sonya Gurewitsch, an accomplished artist widely exhibited in Europe as well as in the States.

The collaboration between these two started in 1968 when Fehr saw studies in acrylics done by Gurewitsch and asked her to create some designs for her needlepoints that would be more artistic than the usual handicraft patterns. This was the beginning of a lifelong project for both artists.

Fehr, a refugee from Nazi Germany, has a Ph.D in chemistry from Columbia University and earned a number of patents while working at GE Electronics in the 1940s. In the 1950s she worked at Knolls Atomic Power Lab. In 1965 she moved to Greenwich with her husband and worked at Yale University with Dr. D. Allan Bromley, one of the world's leading nuclear physicists, until she retired in the 1970s.

The exhibit covers several decades of the artist's work. Her earlier needlepoints are in free form with subtle color transitions. However, as Fehr's problems with her vision increased, she used coarser canvases with more clearly demarcated zones of color. Fehr was a member of The Connecticut Weavers' guild and displayed her work together with Gurewitsch.
