Jesus' Temptations and Us – Our Shared Lenten Journey

Of Jesus' wilderness temptations (Luke 4:1-13), Barbara Brown Taylor writes, "It is, after all, the only way humans will ever learn what 'son of God' really means. A son of God is not someone who is related to God by rising out of his humanity, but someone who is beloved by God for sinking into it even when he is famished, even when he is taunted by the devil himself. It is someone who can listen to every good reason in the world for becoming God's rival and remain God's child instead."

While this is mainly a story about Jesus' identity, it is a story about who we are, as well. It's a story that nudges us to look afresh at the choices we make along our life journeys. It asks us to consider afresh all the choices and invitations, all the insistent requests and temptations to which we may say "yes" or "no," and it reminds us powerfully that our choices each day affect very much how we will live our lives, and how full or empty they may become. It's been said that our capacity to say "yes" and "no" is one of God's greatest gifts to us, except it is a gift many of us do not exercise. Instead, we prefer to believe that we are victims of circumstance, and so we let our freedom to choose atrophy, allowing ourselves to be carried along by this current or that.

The season of Lent, though, is a good time for us to build up our spiritual muscles, so to speak, by reflecting honestly about our own yesses and nos, as well as our need to make our choices more Christlike every single day. Lent invites us to enter into the wilderness and to ask of ourselves the hard questions that solitude brings, especially about what we use to fill the empty place inside of us that belongs to God alone. 
February – Love of . . .

February brought forgiveness and love into the classroom as Roland and I led the lessons for this wintry month.


Why do we forgive?

"Theological Themes in 1 Corinthians: Paul's Approach to the Cross"

We welcome the return of Rev. Fleming Rutledge who was with us last spring in a study of the Gospel of John. This year, we will look at some of Paul's theology as it deals with the cross.

Fleming Rutledge is a preacher and teacher known throughout the mainline Protestant denominations of the United States, Canada, and parts of the United Kingdom. She is the author of six books and has received a grant from the Louisville Institute to complete a book about the meaning of the Crucifixion. Her website is www.generousorthodoxy.org.

One of the first women to be ordained to the priesthood of the Episcopal Church, she served in parish ministry for 22 years. Fourteen of those years were spent at Grace Church on lower Broadway at Tenth Street in New York City. Her most recent position was as guest lecturer in preaching at the University of Toronto School of Theology.

A native of Franklin, Virginia, Rev. Rutledge and her husband, Reginald E. (Dick) Rutledge, recently celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary. They have two daughters and two grandchildren.

LES BEAUX ARTS GALLERY



The new exhibit at Les Beaux Arts Gallery, entitled "Shrink to Fit," features a selection of miniature abstract paintings by Richelle Ivarsson, a Greenwich artist. The show opens on Sunday, February 28 and runs through April 5.

Ivarsson's work focuses on the relationship between the grid pattern and plain fields of solid colors; the geometry of lines reflects pure elegant forms of modern design opening up endless possibilities for more playful and diverse compositions. Her approach entertains the idea that "the lines of the grid, like pasture fences, can be broken and trampled where they are weakest, freedom so gained feels boundless." She feels that these small intimate paintings "find hope in the grids of Piet Mondrian and his legacy."

Ivarsson studied traditional art at the Art Students League of New York between 1997 and 2002. Her early work was representational and included many landscapes. Eventually, she moved on to a more conceptual approach working with large paintings of acrylic on a patchwork of sewn together pieces of clothing used as canvas. Recently, and following her studies in the history of arts, her work took one step further, becoming very abstract and replacing the large size paintings with the miniatures that are displayed in the present show.

Ivarsson has exhibited extensively with the Art Societies of Greenwich. Her first solo in 2000 was

held at The Skyroom of Westfield Court in Stamford. She has won many awards from the Greenwich Art Society and the Art Society of Old Greenwich, where she is an active member. She also teaches art history at Norwalk Community College and is pursuing an MA in writing.

table, striving to succeed in an economy that seems to mock our every effort, thirsting for some sense of personal significance in a world where so many are neglected and forgotten, wandering amidst such desert experiences that may be ours . . . we may find ourselves wrestling with such searching questions as these:

- What is it that we reach for and believe will satisfy us in our needs?
- When we look at ourselves in the mirror, what do we see in it that we like most, and what do we see that we most deplore?
- If you had only one last message to share with the handful of people who are most important to you, what would it be in 25 words or less?
- Of all the things you have done in your life, which is the one you would most like to undo, and which is the one that makes you happiest?
- Is there any person in the world or any cause that, if circumstances called for it, you would be willing to die for?
- If this were the last day of your life, what would you do with it?

To hear ourselves try to answer such questions as these is for us in our Lenten sojourn to begin to hear something not only of who we really are and are trying to become, but also to whom we really belong. The answers we formulate may be humbling, unsettling, even depressing all in all. But if sackcloth and ashes are at the start of such a journey, something like Easter may be at the end . . . and that is our hope and our promise.

We hope to see you in church – participating in our worship, music, fellowship, educational, and outreach and service ministries – along our shared Lenten journey toward Easter this year!

The Transition Committee has begun the process of visiting and contacting potential candidates for the position of Senior Minister and Interim Minister. If a visit is called for, at least two members of the committee travel to the candidate's church on a Sunday to attend a service during which he or she is preaching. The committee spends a considerable amount of time reviewing personal profiles and listening to, viewing, and/or reading sermons before making a decision to visit or contact a minister.

As a result of ads we have posted with seminaries, United Church of Christ, and two magazines, we have been contacted by more than 25 ministers across the country and even beyond. Each of these ministers is considered and will be contacted concerning our decision.
