Developing a Culture of Welcoming Guests and Visitors Every week at Round Hill Community Church, we have wondrous personal opportunities to be vessels through whom God's accepting love is extended to those guests and visitors who come through our doors. Every week we have the chance to speak with our friends about the personal and spiritual meaning of our own involvement in the church's ministries and activities. Every week we encounter individuals who may be looking for a spiritual home in which they can deepen their faith experience and discover special handles by which they can steady and positively direct their steps along the bumpy and uncertain pathways in life. Every week we are invited by the Lord whom we worship to extend a warm word to all who feel led to be with us, so that our church may truly be a place where no one is a stranger and all are welcomed as friends within God's expansive family.

Every week . . . well, I am sure you can catch the drift of what I am seeking to say.

Church growth experts indicate that the primary reason people join the church has to do with the inviting and accepting relationships that gently draw them into a church's life. Several weeks ago, during a youth message in worship, I put a challenge out to the children of RHCC. I pulled out a handful of dollar bills and handed them out to each child. Their assignment? To see how many people they could help with one dollar. The idea being that if they shared what they had, it would go much further than they could ever dream.

Two weeks later, on Palm Sunday, several of the children shared their ideas:

Annina Eggenschwiler mounted her dollar on paper and said that she would send it to the Food Bank to join with others, since so many people need food.

Madison Heath added to her dollar by working at her house, and at a neighbor's house to make even more money to give away.

Peyton White bought seeds with her dollar to grow cucumbers to give away to those who are hungry.

William Green and his friend bought paper with their dollar and made baskets that they sold to make more money to give away.

Emma Heerdt learned that there is a kind of gnat that bites people in different parts of the world, making them sick. After doing some research on the Internet, Emma found some nets that she could buy for a few cents each that would prevent people from being bitten.

Others told me they gave their dollars to organizations such as Habitat for Humanity.

The creative and generous spirit of our youth gave new meaning to me about Jesus' words, "If you want to enter the Kingdom of Heaven, you must become as a child."

RETREAT BY THE SEA

By the Sea, By the Sea, By the Beautiful Sea

You and me . . . (and eight other wonderful women from RHCC) . . . June 7 and 8. We welcome you to participate in our fourth retreat at the Mercy Center in Madison, Connecticut. It will be a time for reflection, meditation, yoga, walks on the beach, swimming (we did last year!), playful exploration, laughter, and sharing a special time with one another. All are welcome but the space is limited to ten people. The cost will be approximately \$170, which includes food, lodging, and activities. The Lark Ascending by Ralph Vaughan Williams and Frederick Delius's *Sea Drift* will be the principal works performed as the Round Hill Community Church celebrates Music Sunday, May 7, at 10:00 a.m. The church is the perfect venue for these works celebrating nature and spring.

During the early part of the 20th century, England enjoyed a "second renaissance" as composers such as Delius and Vaughan Williams wrote works celebrating the beauties of Britain's bucolic countryside. Often a lush post-Wagnerian symphonic vocabulary was meshed with English folk melodies producing a tonal palette that was both sophisticated and welcoming. *The Lark Ascending*, scored for solo violin and orchestra, offers an impressionistic image of the lark, soaring in aerial rings over the landscape, interlacing virtuosic figures in the violin part with English folk tunes.

The violin part will be played by the Bulgarian violinist Vesselin Gellev, whose ensemble Antares was winner of the 2002 Concert Artist Guild International Competition. Gellev has performed as soloist and chamber musician throughout Europe, Japan, Mexico, and the U.S., and is concert master of the Absolute Ensemble, with which he has recorded four CDs. He also performs as concert master of the Juilliard Orchestra and of the Spoleto Festival Orchestra in Italy, and was featured as soloist in Philip Glass's *Violin Concerto* and Mozart's *Sinfonia Concertante* at Lincoln Center during the 2000-2001 season. His performances have been broadcast live on WNYC and National Public Radio's "Performance Today" series in Washington, D.C.

Frederick Delius's dramatic *Sea Drift* was written in 1903, when he was at the height of his career. Based on a portion of Walt Whitman's "Leaves of Grass," the poignant setting of the poem paints somber-hued images of love, the sea, and death as Whitman observes two mating birds – the male's bewilderment following the death of the female becoming analogous to the human experience of loss and grief. Delius's eloquent and inspired setting of the text was written for chorus, orchestra, and baritone solo.

Landon Bowie, the baritone soloist, made his Carnegie Hall debut with Aprile Millo and the Opera Orchestra of New York and was first prizewinner in the Liederkranz Wagner Competition.

LES BEAUX ARTS GALLERY



Oil paintings by former Greenwich resident Milton F. (Bob) Campbell will be on display at Les Beaux Arts Gallery May 5 through June 12. Milton practiced ophthalmology in Greenwich from 1967 to 2000, established Greenwich Ophthalmology Association in 1970, and was Director of Ophthalmology at Greenwich Hospital from 1985 to 2000.

Campbell began his art career after retiring in 2000. He honed his technique through studies at Silvermine in New Canaan, Frog Hollow Art Center in Middlebury, Vermont, and at Vero Beach Art Museum in Forida. An avid outdoorsman, Campbell loves fishing, hunting, hiking, and bird watching.

His passion is painting oils, trying to place on canvas the beauty of the outdoors and the birds and animals that he has observed for so long. His work mixes realism with impressionistic features for a more pleasing creation.

Previously, his paintings have been shown in Middlebury and Cornwall, Vermont, and in Vero Beach and Orchid, Florida.
