PASTOR'S MESSAGE

To say that these are anxious times for people regardless of their place in the social order is an understatement. Concerns about finances, the environment, and terrorism affect us all. Add to that the personal problems that inevitably arise in everyone's life and it's surprising that we're able to function at all. Anxiety and stress, the cause of so much disease and disease, is inevitable. As Gilda Radner was fond of reminding us, "If it's not one thing, it's another."

Jesus knew this. He knew that anxiety can paralyze a person. In the Sermon on the Mount he said to his disciples and others: "Do not be anxious about your life." Well, that's much easier said than done for most of us, even though we know the truth of the matter in mind. Jesus goes on to ask rhetorically, "And which of you, by being anxious, can add one cubit to his span of life?" In short, anxiety gets us nowhere.

So, what is one to do? Well, fortunately we stand in a spiritual tradition that gives us some sensible practices to reduce stress and experience life in all its fullness. I think meditation is the most important practice to that end. There is a stress reduction class each week at Greenwich Library led by a friend of mine, Jim Bandler. We studied together for years at a school in New York City. Others in our congregation have practiced or are practicing meditation regularly. For the remainder of this year, every Thursday evening from 6:30 to 7:30, those who wish to learn more about the practice of meditation/stress reduction are invited to join me in the Church Parlor. You don't have to come every week, but when you can. This group is open to others in our community as well.

Traditional prayer is also helpful in focusing the mind on what matters and leading us to take action,

Bible Study: Isaiah's Voices Sunday, October 23, November 6 and 20 11:15 a.m.

Reverend Doctor Susan DeGeorge begins her three-part series on Isaiah's Voices on October 23, but she is being awfully quiet until then about those Voices. For those of you who have not heard her before, Susan is an Associate Minister at South Presbyterian Church in Dobb's Ferry, and is a licensed attorney (there seem to be a bunch of these around here) in New York and Connecticut. More importantly for us, she has graduate degrees from Columbia and Union Theological and has worked to bring college education back into New York State prisons. If you have ever wondered what the Hebrew or Greek source word for the English translation of a biblical passage is and want to know if we ever got it right, you must attend. It promises to be illuminating!

Forum: Global Workers Justice Alliance Sunday, November 13

On November 13, we have Cathleen Coran of Global Workers Justice Alliance (www.globalworkers. org) for a forum on justice, human trafficking, and the migrant worker. Anita Keire has arranged for Cathleen to speak about her work in the United States, and abroad in Guatemala and East Timor. The issue is what she calls "portable justice." She is a summa cum laude graduate of the American University Washington College of Law and Dartmouth College.

Finally, what CFD would like to do each issue is recommend a book for reading. And October's choice is Marcus Borg's new 2010 book, *Speaking Christian: Why Christian Words Have Lost Their Meaning and Power and How They Can Be Restored*; Harper One Publishers. The Greenwich Library has one copy . . . when I return mine. Borg focuses on words such as *sin, born again, redemption, savior*, and *Jesus' sacrifice*, among others, while showing how current popular Christian theology often distorts the early meanings and concepts of these powerful religious ideas. This book may become the basis for a teaching series next year.

In Strauss's *Ariadne Auf Naxos*, the lighthearted, flirtatious Zerbinetta attempts to cheer the regal, suffering Ariadne. The elegant style of Mozart and Strauss is never absent, but both composers broaden the spectrum of human possibility by presenting characters both highbrow and lowbrow. Please join us for an evening of beautiful music followed by a sumptuous reception.
