Thanksgiving Reflections

In one of his journal notations, Thomas Merton remarks that somehow we are always thinking that our life will be truly happy "when..." We are seemingly not satisfied with what is currently our situation because we have it in our mind that our life will not be happy until something else occurs – when I have one more thing that I want, when I get rid of that personality flaw of mine, when I can finally have life as I have always dreamed it could be, when I am truly successful, when I learn to pray better, when I find the right person in my life, when... when... when...

But waiting for the "when" can keep us from appreciating what we now have. Longing for promises and dreaming dreams is not a harmful deed as long as the present moment is not overlooked, as long as gratitude is felt deep inside for what is already here, as long as we do not base our happiness on what is still wanting. Thankfulness for what has already been given is the foundation for hoping for what is not yet. The nudging in all this for us is that we need to put aside our "when this happens" and our "if this could only be" and our "when things get better" and our "as soon as we have this" kind of mentality or orientation. We need to embrace the daily invitation to harvest what we now have, and gather all the many gifts that are already ours. We need to observe what has already been placed in the granaries of our own hearts and marvel at the abundance.

Indeed, the invitation each day is for us to stand before this heap of blessings and take a long, grateful look, saying farewell to our "when" and being thankful for what is.

Joyce Rupp reflects something of this truth in her poem about being grateful for all the little moments of our lives:

The Chamber Players



Risa Renae Harman has been the professional soprano and soloist in our choir for many years. All of us have enjoyed her spectacular voice as she has starred in numerous performances for our Church. Now, on Sunday, November 15, at 4:00 p.m.,

Risa will perform for the first time with The Chamber Players of the GSO. The concert will highlight Risa singing Handel's German Arias for Voice, Violin, and Continuo, a motet by Vivaldi, Chanson Perpetuelle by Chausson, and Haydn's Scottish Songs for Voice, Cello, and Piano. (the program will be repeated on Monday at the Bruce Museum, 8:00 p.m.)

Risa has performed at the Kennedy Center, with the Lake George Opera, and as Artist-in-Residence with the Bay View Music Festival. She has sung with the New York City Opera, Lyric Opera Cleveland, and Glimmerglass Opera, and has appeared as a soloist at National Cathedral, Alice Tully Hall, Avery Fisher Hall, Trinity Church, and Weill Hall.

The Chamber Players are in their thirty-eighth season and have rarely sponsored a program that includes the voice. This is an unusual opportunity to hear and appreciate the chamber music literature that is written for this medium. The concert will include a guest violist and a cellist who are both members of the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra.

LES BEAUX ARTS GALLERY

A new collection of paintings by Riverside resident Hazel R. Jarvis will be on display at Les Beaux Arts Gallery through November 24. Jarvis, British-born and a longtime Greenwich resident, is well known for her exquisite traditional watercolor botanical illustrations. She has evolved over the years as an accomplished landscaper in the manner of the Impressionists. This new work, which includes mixed-media and collages, is still inspired by nature, but incorporates a highly decorative Japanese approach to nature, resulting in more abstract and stylized compositions. It has less definition with looser brush-strokes and vivid colors.



Jarvis studied botanical illustration with Carol Bolt in New York, and, during a five-year residency in Tokyo in the 1990s, studied traditional Japanese painting with Shoko Ohta, a fourth-generation artist. Her work is held in the permanent collection of the Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation at Carnegie Mellon University, and was also shown recently in a three-person exhibition "In and Out of the Garden" at the Flinn Gallery in Greenwich.
