

Rally Day Music to Feature Russian-Israeli Trumpeter David Glukh



The piccolo trumpet virtuoso David Glukh will be a guest instrumentalist for the Rally Day service on September 12, when he will perform works of the Baroque Era as Prelude and Postlude. He will be joined by soprano Risa Renae Harman in Handel's "Let the Bright Seraphim."

Since his graduation from The Juilliard School in May 2000, David Glukh has been leading an active performance schedule, first as a member of Dallas Brass (2000-2002) and later as a composer and soloist of David Glukh International Ensemble, Manhattan Soloists, and Wholly Brass, in addition to solo engagements throughout the world. As a soloist, David has appeared with the Louisville Orchestra, Northeastern Pennsylvania Philharmonic, Jupiter Symphony, Lyric Theater Orchestra, Raanana Symphoniette, IDF Orchestra, Ulianovsk Symphony Orchestra, and Ensemble Melodia.

David Glukh was born in Moscow in 1975, where he attended the Gnesin's Music School. In 1990 he immigrated to Israel, where he spent the following three years in the Thelma Yellin High School for the Arts. He later served in the Army Orchestra from 1993 to 1996.

LES BEAUX ARTS GALLERY

Les Beaux Arts Gallery opens its new season with a noted portrait artist and RHCC member, Fred Mason. The exhibit starts on Sunday, September 5, and runs through October 13, 2010. It will showcase many of Fred's commissioned portraits.



Fred's paintings are on display in most of the 50 states and many foreign countries. His studio is here in Greenwich, but his commissions require frequent national and international travel. They include personal portraits of family groups and individuals, often accompanied by their pets, as well as official portraits of corporate, university, museum, theater, hospital, and military leaders.

A native of Salt Lake City, Utah, Fred began drawing at the age of five and turned professional at the age of 14, when he went to work for a sign painter. He earned his BFA at the University of Utah while working as a staff artist at the Salt Lake Tribune-Telegraph newspapers. After his military duty, he worked as an illustrator and commercial artist while completing his education in the arts at the Art Students

League, NYU, and Brooklyn Museum School of Fine Arts. After college he worked for seven years at Cooper Studios in New York City, where he won a number of awards before turning his attention to fine art. He has lectured and taught at a number of workshops and art schools and is currently on the advisory board of the College of Fine Arts of the University of Utah.

Fred's style, which he calls contemporary realism, is specific and contained with a palette reminiscent of the Impressionists. His goal in painting a portrait is not only to create a physical likeness, but also to capture the unique personality of his subject.

ROUND HILL COMMUNITY CHURCH CAPITAL CAMPAIGN



The first part of the Community House renovation was finished last September, and during this past year we enjoyed the new floor in the main room, the new windows, the new siding, and many, many more updates to our historic Community House. When on the Church campus, you have probably observed your Capital Campaign pledge dollars hard at work once again. The Board of Trustees approved a budget of \$625,000 to complete the final phase of the Community House renovation. These renovations should be completed by early September. Following is a list of the major items that were completed this summer:

- Air conditioning
- New handicapped accessible restrooms
- New ceiling and lighting in the main hall
- New roof
- Upgraded electrical wiring

In addition to the Community House renovations, your Capital Campaign dollars have also gone for additional improvements to the Church building. You may have noticed the entrance to the Church looks much better now with the replacement of the stone steps leading up to the entrance and the replacement of the outer portico outside the front door.

We are delighted with how much we have been able to accomplish in the last two years. But there is still more to do! We have a long list of improvements we would still like to make to the Church, but given the constrained budget, we are limited in what we

can do unless we get further contributions. Another \$300,000 in contributions would go a long way to covering many of the needed improvements. Some of these include:

- Replace Sanctuary windows
- Repair hallway carpet in church
- Pave the front circle and back lower parking lot
- Improve outside lighting
- Replace the stage curtains and provide better stage lighting and sound
- Install a sprinkler system
- Fix drainage issues throughout the campus
- Install a generator

For those of you who already have contributed to the Capital Campaign, we again say a big THANK YOU! We raised more than \$2 million. You can see that your contributions are improving our Church campus as well as providing an improved space for children and adult events in our community.

We would also like to thank the tireless Building Committee, which has been led so ably by Helen Dixon. The committee has worked for over two years on this project and includes Frank DeNicola, Suzy Simpson, John Lowe, Art Landi, and Dick Bergstresser. Next time you see them, please let them know that we all appreciate their hard work and the magnificent result.

questions remain the same.

Parents and grandparents generally want to nurture the spiritual life of children. We want them to be gracious and grateful, courageous in times of difficulty, with a sense of purpose and joy in life. Society is good at teaching children to be consumers and competitors, but does little in fostering spirituality. For that, the role of parents and grandparents is crucially important. Many of us feel inadequate to the task, especially when we often feel less than certain ourselves about the answers.

But that, I think, is the point. It's not our answers to the questions that are important, but the questions themselves. As Rabbi Sasso said, there seems to be an innate spirituality in children, a sense of wonder, spontaneity, imagination, and creativity that we want to support and foster. What children lack is the language and the opportunity to have a conversation about the questions. Parents and grandparents can give them that opportunity, not by offering easy answers to hard questions, but by saying something like, "That is a really hard question. Let's think about it together." The language to use is not the language of the theologian, but the language of the storyteller, speaking about what we know from our experiences in life. More often than not, Jesus taught by use of stories and parables. He didn't offer a creed or a dogma, but an example. I need to remember that. I need to work on that, because talking to children in this way does not come naturally to me. I discovered listening to the radio program that not only do I have much to learn, but also that there is help available. I can think of little else that is as important as fostering a sense of spirituality in young people, especially today. Will you join me?

Blessing of the Animals Worship Service Sunday, September 26, 10:00 a.m.

Everyone is invited to come with or without a pet.



SEARCH COMMITTEE



FLU SHOT CLINIC

Save the Date!

Round Hill Community Church is pleased to announce that we are hosting a flu shot clinic this fall on Thursday, October 14, 2010, from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m. Preventa Health will be offering both influenza and pneumococcal immunizations. Last year, because the H1N1 virus emerged after production began on the seasonal vaccine, two separate vaccines were needed to protect against seasonal flu and the H1N1 pandemic flu virus, but this year, only one vaccine is necessary. The cost of each immunization is FREE for those with Medicare Part B (must present card), and for all others a flu shot is \$25 and the pneumonia shot is \$45. Only cash or check will be accepted, but a receipt will be provided to file with private insurance. The Centers for Disease Control recommend that anyone over four years of age should get a flu shot every year. If you have any additional questions about the flu shot please contact Preventa Health at 203-274-7896.
