Catching the Spirit of Round Hill

Following a worship service a few months ago, I was approached by a man who had been in attendance. He told me he had arrived quite early from out of town, and, having spent an hour or so before the service reading through a recent copy

of our church newsletter and our Annual Report in its entirety, he wanted very much to speak to me about the uniqueness of our church.

In our time together, he chronicled his disappointments with his own church experience in his home state of Ohio – dwindling attendance in church school and worship, the dry predictability of the services, a narrowly defined theology that seemed exclusive and lifeless. He said that it seemed to him that his church was doing nothing more than rearranging chairs on the deck of the *Titanic*, struggling not to sink and seeking only to survive.

But here at Round Hill Community Church, he said, he sensed something very different, something much alive, something unique and engaging and attractive. He wanted to know the secret of our life together. I spoke with him about our church's history and its struggle for independence; about our commitment to being a community church in which our unity is celebrated within the context of our rich diversity; about our church family that is small enough so that everyone is known by name and yet large enough to have had a beneficial impact upon the world's wounds and hungers and hurts; about our support for strong worship, music, and educational experiences; and about our fellowship's desire to focus upon those continued on page 10

New Director of Children's Ministries Thomas Mahoney



We are pleased to announce that Thomas Mahoney will be joining us as the new Director of Children's Ministries beginning in September, 2007. Tom will be working approximately 20 hours a week as he leads the church's program in Christian education for children from nursery age through middle school.

In addition to leading and teaching in the Sunday morning "Rotation Model" for church school children, Tom will coordinate the children's monthly outreach and mission endeavors, recruit childcare for church programs, and provide leadership for special events throughout the year, including Rally Day activities, Advent Workshop and Yule Log Service, Christmas on Round Hill, the annual Christmas Pageant, Easter Day activities, and the annual church picnic in June.

Tom is currently the Director of the Office of Special Clinical Services in the Greenwich Department of Health, where he has served since 1989, and where he will continue to work in addition to his new church responsibilities. A 1981 graduate of Fordham University's Graduate School of Religion and Religious Education, Tom directed the religious education programs for three churches, two of which are here in Greenwich, after which he became more focused in the realm of human services. He has remained involved in local church programs, affirming and embracing the role and value of the spiritual life.

He says, "Whatever career I have chosen, teaching has been a fundamental responsibility, serving as a high school English and Religion teacher, a director

of several religious education programs, a trainer of volunteers in several non-profit organizations, and a trainer for professional emergency responders. I am passionate that religious education builds community, fosters spiritual development, and provides values that will be used in everyday life."

At Round Hill, Tom looks forward to building "a community where children know, value, and live a Christian life – that they care for one another, are concerned about justice, that they help those who are less fortunate; that they know that God is alive and present to them in the good days and bad . . . that the older children and youth will mentor/nurture the younger ones."

He also has indicated that he looks forward to serving the church in this new, expanded position in Christian education. He affirms how the church members and staff have welcomed him to the church, calling them "hospitable, engaging, and, most of all, sincere."

Round Hill Community Church and its leaders eagerly anticipate Tom's leadership beginning in September, and celebrate his willingness to embrace such an important and exciting calling.

Rotation Stories

The Church School will continue to utilize the Rotation Workshop Model as the structure for its curriculum. Rotation workshop means that children work on the same theme/story for a month using different learning approaches each Sunday. The workshops may include art, storytelling, drama, music, cooking, and/or Bible literacy.

September Mission Outreach - Waterside School

Waterside School in Stamford is a co-educational kindergarten to fifth grade independent school whose mission is to provide children who are too often underserved, access to opportunities for personal and educational excellence and to prepare them, in time, for positions of leadership and responsibility.

The Waterside School opened with twenty-seven students, a handful of teachers, and a bold and timely ambition. Now spanning six grades, with one hundred students and a teaching faculty of twenty-three, the school has grown larger, stronger, and better.

Members of Waterside's Class of 2006 earned admission and scholarships to the area's finest independent schools – Brunswick School, Convent of the Sacred Heart, Greenwich Academy, Stanwich School, and others.

During September we will collect school supplies for Waterside. Bring your donations to church and deposit them in the school bus. At the end of the month we will give them to RHCC member Jody Visage, who is Head of Waterside School.



Change for Children - Children for Change

Our ongoing mission initiative will involve collecting change for a children's organization. Instead of passing around the offering basket at the start of class, children will drop their coins in an old-fashioned milk can every Sunday. We ask that children collect change during the week, bring it to church on Sunday, and drop it in the milk can. When we have filled the milk can, our children will vote to donate the funds to an organization that benefits children. We hope that they learn that the change they give will change another child's life.

Sunday, Sept. 23 Worship: Report on Nicaragua Trip

On August 11, sixteen adults and youth from RHCC traveled to Guanacastillo, Nicaragua, to participate in a work camp through Bridges to Community, an international development non-governmental organization based in Ossining, New York. Bridges to Community organizes and facilitates international cross-cultural service trips for volunteers to live and work in materially poor communities, most of which occur in Nicaragua, the second poorest country in the Western hemisphere. This year, they expect to take nearly 1,000 volunteers on almost 50 trips to participate with local communities on their development projects.



An experience with Bridges allows participants to catch an authentic glimpse of how a vast majority of the world's population lives. They encourage volunteers to think critically and carefully about our global interdependence, foreign policies, economic impact, and stereotypes. While Bridges trips are typically thought of as service trips, they encourage volunteers to think of service as an experience of "what we can do



together" rather than "what we can do for them." And together, in a week, we built two cinder block houses that will now be home for two families of four.

Bridges philosophy says, "Our sincere hope is that by living and working alongside one another we can build friendships and understanding that are life changing for volunteers on both sides of the 'bridge.'" This indeed was the experience of the 16 RHCC members and friends who traveled to Nicaragua in August.



High School Discussion Group

Twice a month high school youth meet during the worship service in the upstairs room of the Community House to discuss issues that affect their lives and their faith. Several of our youth made the trip to Nicaragua this summer and found it to be a particularly rewarding experience. The group will plan and participate in other service projects that benefit both our local and the wider national and international communities.

Parents and church leaders will alternate guiding the group with the aid of our church school curriculum for older youth. Dates will be announced in the Bulletin and by email.

"Theology and Literature: Looking at the Works of Emily Dickinson - Wrestling with the Face of Consciousness," Dr. Lee Schlesinger



Inheritors of a radical-Protestant tradition, many of the great American writers struggle with its language and concerns and both evade it and reinvent it. No writer does this more dramatically and powerfully than the great poet Emily Dickinson. We will read several of her poems that develop her complicated relation to her Christian tradition and that indicate the extent of her spiritual and intellectual daring.

After receiving his B.A. from Brandeis University (1969) and his Ph.D. from Yale University (1973), where he taught for two years, Lee Schlesinger came to SUNY Purchase in 1975, and has been teaching there since then. His primary interest is American Literature, specifically 20thcentury American poetry, and much of his teaching is of 19th-century writers Emerson, Whitman, Dickinson, and Melville. His signature course, however, is "The Bible" - a literary and historical survey of that vast and troubling text. He also teaches and lectures in high schools, libraries, churches, and synagogues. Beyond the classroom he is an avid and experienced birder, and a wide-eyed, appreciative traveler.

Intercepted Correspondence – Bringing about Change in the World

Bob Culp found this piece to be particularly relevant at this time, especially after hearing from some of the participants of the mission trip to Nicaragua.

From an address given by the Rev. Jim Wallis, Founder of Sojourners, to students at Georgetown University in May 2007.

"There are always great inhumanities that we inflict upon one another in this world, great injustices that cry out to God for redress, and great gaps in our moral recognition of them. When the really big offenses are finally corrected, finally changed, it is always and only because something has happened to change our perception of the moral issues at stake. Something gets our attention, something goes deeper than it has before and hooks us in places we call the heart, the soul, the spirit.

In many places of the world, what we see now offends us, offends our understanding of the sanctity and dignity of life, offends our basic notions of fairness and justice, offends our most basic values. It violates our idea of the common good, and starts to tug at our deepest places. We cross the line of unacceptability. We become impatient and intolerant in the face of injustices.

Ask where your gifts intersect with the groaning needs of the world – there is your vocation. The antidote to cynicism is not optimism, but action. And action is finally born out of hope. Out in the world, you will live your way into a new way of thinking and being. The key is to believe that the world can be changed, because it is only that belief that ever changes the world. And if not us, who will believe? And if not you, who?"

LES BEAUX ARTS GALLERY



Les Beaux Arts gallery is opening its new season with a wonderful exhibition featuring the work Hazel Jarvis, a well-known artist from Greenwich who specializes in botanical illustrations, abstract landscapes, and mixed media collages. The show opens September 9, and will run through October 10. There will be an opening reception on Sunday, September 9, at the Gallery from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. All are welcome.

Ms. Jarvis received her B.A. in History and Theory of Art from Sussex University in England. Upon moving to the United States, she studied botanical illustration with Carol Bolt in New York, and during a five-year residency in Tokyo in the 1990s, studied traditional Japanese painting with Shoko Ohta, a well-known fourth generation artist. She has incorporated the highly decorative Japanese approach to nature into her own work.

Ms. Jarvis's paintings have been featured in exhibitions organized by the American Society of Botanical Artists, including shows at Longwood Gardens and the New York Horticultural Society. Her work is held in the permanent collection of the Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation at Carnegie Mellon University and was included in its tenth International Exhibition in 2001. Her work was most recently shown at a three-person exhibition, "In and Out of the Garden," at the Flinn Gallery in Greenwich, in the fall of 2006. Hazel Jarvis lives and teaches in Greenwich.

MUSIC AT ROUND HILL



Renowned trumpeter Dominic Derasse will join our choir on September 9, Rally Day. For the Prelude, he will perform Albinoni's Concerto in B flat major and for the Postlude, Martini's *Toccata*.

Born in Paris and growing up in Nice, France, Dominic Derasse studied trumpet with Gaston Cagnon, and solfege and theory at the Nice Conservatory of Music. He graduated from the Paris Conservatory with First Prize in 1979. Mr. Derasse was the 1982 laureate of the French National Teaching Diploma in trumpet and began to teach at the Vernon (Eure) and Vaulx le Penil (Ile de France) music conservatories.

In August 1985, Dominic won the position of principal trumpet with the Charleston Symphony Orchestra in South Carolina. He moved to New York in 1987, and has fast become one of the most sought after trumpet players and educators in the area. He has appeared with the Eos Orchestra, New York Grand Opera, New York Philharmonic, American Symphony Orchestra, Orchestra of St. Luke's, and Concordia, and has played in a variety of Broadway shows.
